OVERALL LEARNING:

In the course of addressing the various issues with pre-designed programmes GJS has enhanced its learning on the program, on the issue and on the affectivity of such programs. While the outcome is noticeable in many cases the effects are not so explicit; and this asks for a test of our patience. - ◆ Promoting/Facilitating community participation is vital in the matter of affectivity and sustainability of a development feature; and this score over the concept & practice of making/seeing people as beneficiaries.
- ◆ Regeneration / restoration and upkeep of livelihood sources, CPRs is more important than delivery of scheme components.

- ♦ Work-culture and entrepreneurship strengthen citizenship, the community and the nation.
- ♦ Team workers & volunteers are also community members and do harbor similar weakness as the commonness; and this has to be done away with.
